1st was Bro. Chas. C. Rogers who after many years service to his fellow masons in a public capacity, and served his lodge

official capacity. He joined the Lodge in early manhood, and he enjoyed the fellowship of his brethren.

But the Grand Master of the Universe with the one sound of the gavel pronounced Bro. Rogers from Robins Gap Lodge, we trust to the Celestial Lodge above. His body was carried to the Mt. City Cemetery and then buried with masonic honors on January 18th 1933.

2nd. Was our beloved past master W.S. Price who had been a loyal and devoted member for 60 years, and his body was consigned to the ground on June 29, 1933, with masonic honors. The next to fall was the stalwart personage of Bro. O.W. Roney, in what seemed to be the meridian of life. He had only been one of the Craft for a short while. His remains was deposited in the earth by his brethren on Oct. 18, 1933, with the usual masonic honors.

And last to answer the call was the hero of the Sixties, he who loved his old flag with the Stars and Strips. But he who loved masonry also. He was a regular attendee at its meetings, and the meetings of the order of the Eastern Star, and brother Capt. W.G. Doyler, entered the threshold of masonry late in life. He had been a member for 18 years, when his spirit took its flight, his body was accompanied by the brethren of his lodge, to Austell Ga and there laid to rest by the side of his first wife with masonic honors Oct. 19, 1933, and we trust that the dressboard of their lives has passed such an inspection as to admit them into the Grand Lodge above, where the Supreme Architect of the universe presides.
